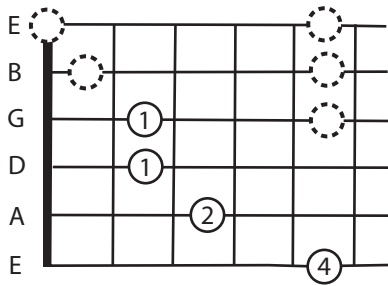
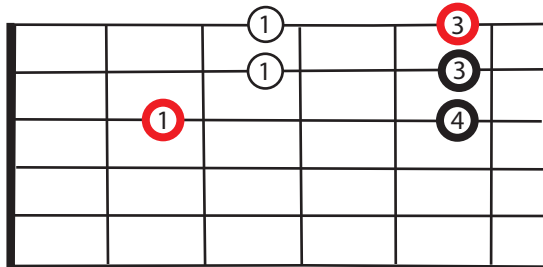


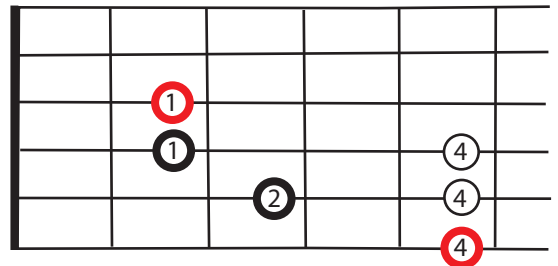
This particular A minor chord is not often used except as a strong rhythm structure, but the associated scalar patterns are often used.



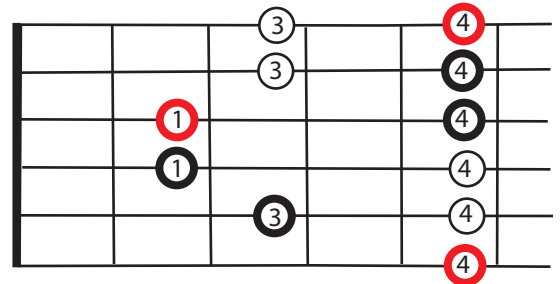
A Minor Pentatonic Scale, one octave

the notes are A, C, D, D#(Eb), E, G and A.

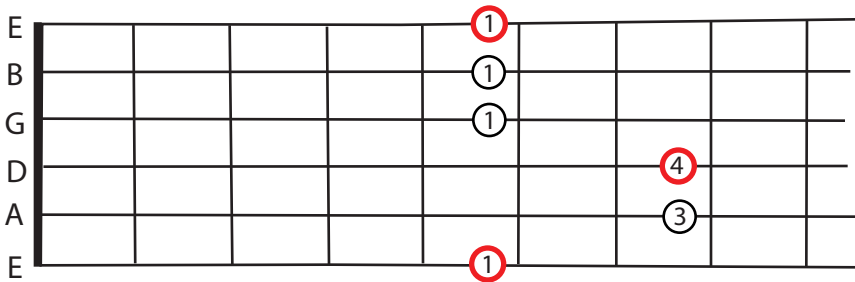


A Minor Pentatonic Scale, two octaves

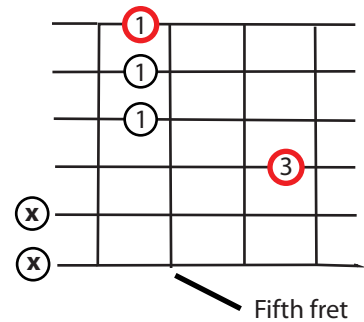

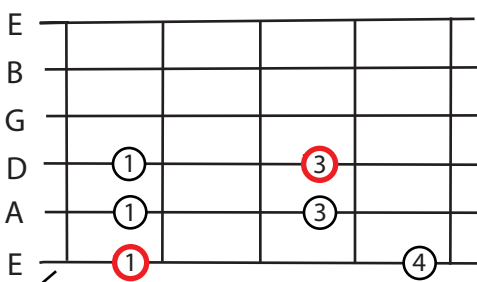
The A minor chord barred at fifth fret



The Am chord, half bar, fifth and sixth strings not sounded.

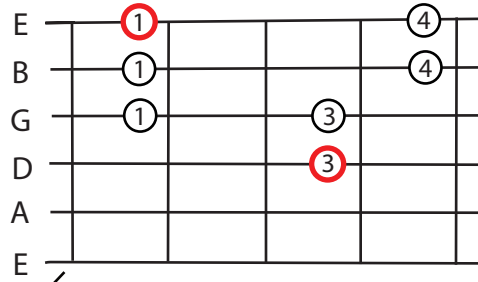


A minor Pentatonic scale, 1 octave



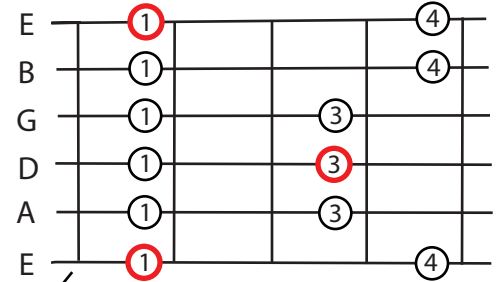
Fifth fret
